

## QW/QC030-Series Power Modules: dc-dc Converters; 18 Vdc to 36 Vdc or 36 Vdc to 75 Vdc Inputs



The QW/QC030-Series Power Modules use advanced, surface-mount technology and deliver high-quality, efficient, and compact dc-dc conversion.

### Description

The QC/QW030-Series Power Modules are dc-dc converters that operate over an input voltage range of 18 Vdc to 36 Vdc or 36 Vdc to 75 Vdc and provide a precisely regulated dc output. The outputs are fully isolated from the inputs, allowing versatile polarity configurations and grounding connections. The modules have maximum power ratings of 30 W at a typical full-load efficiency of up to 86%.

These encapsulated modules offer a metal case for optimum thermal performance. Threaded-through holes are provided to allow easy mounting or addition of a heat sink for high-temperature applications. The standard feature set includes remote sensing, output trim, and remote on/off for convenient flexibility in distributed power applications.

## Fusing Considerations

**CAUTION: This power module is not internally fused. An input line fuse must always be used.**

This encapsulated power module can be used in a wide variety of applications, ranging from simple stand-alone operation to an integrated part of a sophisticated power architecture. To preserve maximum flexibility, internal fusing is not included; however, to achieve maximum safety and system protection, always use an input line fuse. The safety agencies require a normal-blow fuse with a maximum rating of 5 A (for QW030) and 10 A (for QC030) (see Safety Considerations section). Based on the information provided in this data sheet on inrush energy and maximum dc input current, the same type of fuse with a lower rating can be used. Refer to the fuse manufacturer's data for further information.

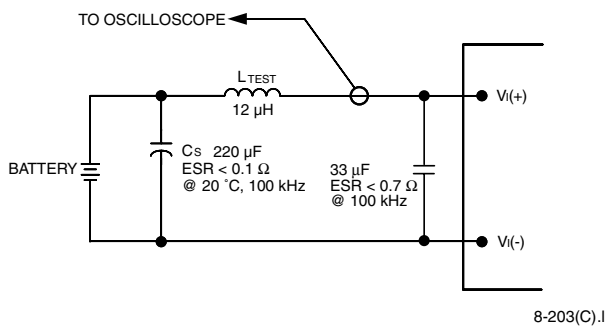

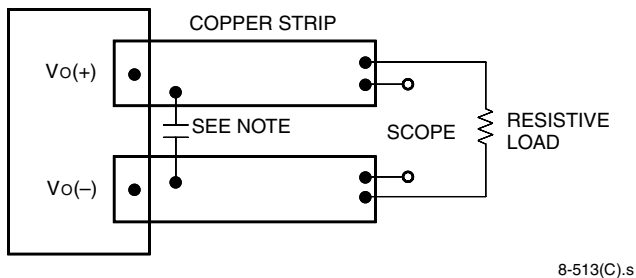

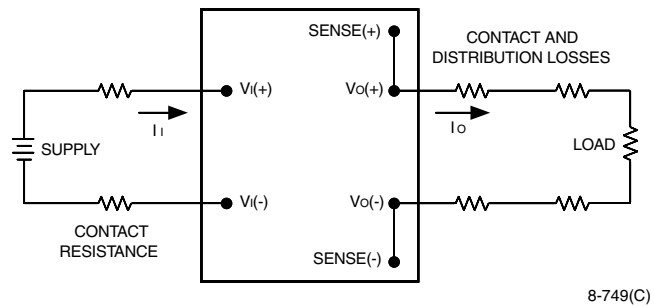

**Design Considerations**

**Grounding Considerations**

For the QC modules, the case is internally connected to the  $V_I(-)$  pin. For the QW modules, the case is internally connected to the  $V_I(+)$  pin.

## Design Considerations (continued)

### Input Source Impedance

The power module should be connected to a low ac-impedance input source. Highly inductive source impedances can affect the stability of the power module. If the input source inductance exceeds  $4 \mu\text{H}$ , a  $33 \mu\text{F}$  electrolytic capacitor ( $\text{ESR} < 0.7 \Omega$  at  $100 \text{ kHz}$ ) mounted close to the power module helps ensure stability of the unit.

## Safety Considerations

### QW Modules

For safety-agency approval of the system in which the power module is used, the power module must be installed in compliance with the spacing and separation requirements of the end-use safety agency standard, i.e., *UL60950*, *CSA C22.2 No. 60950-00*, and *VDE 0805 (EN60950-1)*.

If the input source is non-SELV (ELV or a hazardous voltage greater than  $60 \text{ Vdc}$  and less than or equal to  $75 \text{ Vdc}$ ), for the module's output to be considered meeting the requirements of safety extra-low voltage (SELV), all of the following must be true:

- The input source is to be provided with reinforced insulation from any hazardous voltages, including the ac mains.
- One  $V_I$  pin and one  $V_O$  pin are to be grounded, or both the input and output pins are to be kept floating.
- The input pins of the module are not operator accessible.
- Another SELV reliability test is conducted on the whole system, as required by the safety agencies, on the combination of supply source and the subject module to verify that under a single fault, hazardous voltages do not appear at the module's output.

**Note:** Do not ground either of the input pins of the module without grounding one of the output pins. This may allow a non-SELV voltage to appear between the output pin and ground.

The power module has extra-low voltage (ELV) outputs when all inputs are ELV.

The input to the QW030 is to be provided with a maximum  $5 \text{ A}$  normal-blow fuse in the ungrounded lead.

The input to the QC030 is to be provided with a maximum  $10 \text{ A}$  normal-blow fuse in the ungrounded lead.

## Feature Descriptions

### Overcurrent Protection

To provide protection in a fault (output overload) condition, the unit is equipped with internal current-limiting circuitry and can endure current limiting for an unlimited duration. At the point of current-limit inception, the unit shifts from voltage control to current control. If the output voltage is pulled very low during a severe fault, the current-limit circuit can exhibit either foldback or tailout characteristics (output-current decrease or increase). The unit operates normally once the output current is brought back into its specified range.

### Remote On/Off

Two remote on/off options are available. Positive logic remote on/off turns the module on during a logic-high voltage on the remote ON/OFF pin, and off during a logic low. Negative logic remote on/off, device code suffix "1," turns the module off during logic-high voltage and on during a logic low.

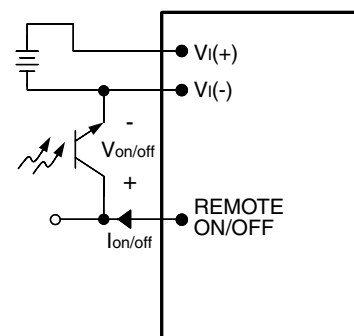
To turn the power module on and off, the user must supply a switch to control the voltage between the on/off terminal and the  $V_I(-)$  terminal ( $V_{\text{on/off}}$ ). The switch may be an open collector or equivalent (see Figure 4). A logic low is  $V_{\text{on/off}} = -0.7 \text{ V}$  to  $1.2 \text{ V}$ . The maximum  $I_{\text{on/off}}$  during a logic low is  $1 \text{ mA}$ . The switch should maintain a logic-low voltage while sinking  $1 \text{ mA}$ .

During a logic high, the maximum  $V_{\text{on/off}}$  generated by the power module is  $15 \text{ V}$ . The maximum allowable leakage current of the switch at  $V_{\text{on/off}} = 15 \text{ V}$  is  $50 \mu\text{A}$ .

If not using the remote on/off feature, do one of the following:

For positive logic, leave the ON/OFF pin open.

For negative logic, short the ON/OFF pin to  $V_I(-)$ .

**Feature Descriptions** (continued)

**Remote Sense**

Remote sense minimizes the effects of distribution losses by regulating the voltage at the remote-sense connections. The voltage between the remote-sense pins and the output terminals must not exceed the output voltage sense range given in the Feature Specifications table, e.g., on the QW030A:

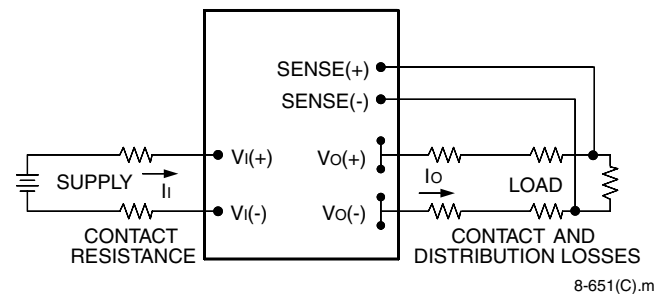
$$[V_{O(+)} - V_{O(-)}] - [SENSE(+)-SENSE(-)] \leq 0.5 V$$

The voltage between the  $V_{O(+)}$  and  $V_{O(-)}$  terminals must not exceed the minimum output overvoltage protection value shown in the Feature Specifications table. This limit includes any increase in voltage due to remote-sense compensation and output voltage set-point adjustment (trim). See Figure 5.

If not using the remote-sense feature to regulate the output at the point of load, then connect SENSE(+) to  $V_{O(+)}$  and SENSE(-) to  $V_{O(-)}$  at the module.

Although the output voltage can be increased by both the remote sense and by the trim, the maximum increase for the output voltage is not the sum of both. The maximum increase is the larger of either the remote sense or the trim. Consult your Tyco Electronics' Account Manager or Application Engineer if you need to increase the output voltage more than the above limitation.

The amount of power delivered by the module is defined as the voltage at the output terminals multiplied by the output current. When using remote sense and trim, the output voltage of the module can be increased, which at the same output current would increase the power output of the module. Care should be taken to ensure that the maximum output power of the module remains at or below the maximum rated power.

**Output Voltage Set-Point Adjustment (Trim)**

Output voltage trim allows the user to increase or decrease the output voltage set point of a module. This is accomplished by connecting an external resistor between the TRIM pin and either the SENSE(+) or SENSE(-) pins. The trim resistor should be positioned close to the module.

If not using the trim feature, leave the TRIM pin open.

With an external resistor between the TRIM and SENSE(+) pins ( $R_{adj-down}$ ), the output voltage set point ( $V_{O, adj}$ ) decreases (see Figure 6). The following equation determines the required external-resistor value to obtain a change in output voltage from  $V_{O, nom}$  to  $V_{O, adj}$ . The values of G, H, and L are shown in Table 5.

$$R_{adj-down} = \left[ \frac{(V_{O, adj} - L)G}{(V_{O, nom} - V_{O, adj})} - H \right] \Omega$$

The QC/QW030 modules have a fixed current-limit set point. As the output voltage is adjusted down, the available output power is reduced.

With an external resistor connected between the TRIM and SENSE(-) pins ( $R_{adj-up}$ ), the output voltage set point ( $V_{O, adj}$ ) increases (see Figure 7).

The following equation determines the required external-resistor value to obtain a change in output voltage from  $V_{O, nom}$  to  $V_{O, adj}$ . The values of G, H, K, and L are shown in Table 5.

$$R_{adj-up} = \left( \left[ \frac{GL}{[(V_{O, adj} - L) - K]} \right] - H \right) \Omega$$

The voltage between the  $V_{O(+)}$  and  $V_{O(-)}$  terminals must not exceed the minimum output overvoltage protection value shown in the Feature Specifications table. This limit includes any increase in voltage due to remote-sense compensation and output voltage set-point adjustment (trim). See Figure 5.

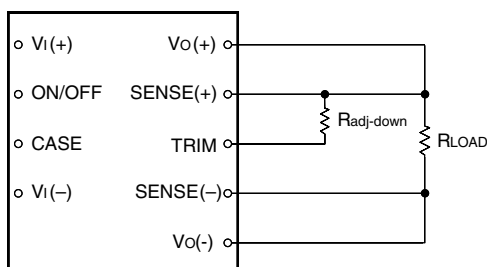

### Output Voltage Set-Point Adjustment (Trim) (continued)

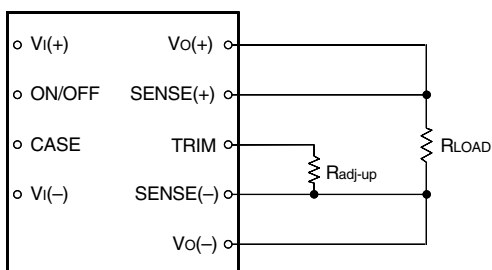
Although the output voltage can be increased by both the remote sense and by the trim, the maximum increase for the output voltage is not the sum of both. The maximum increase is the larger of either the remote sense or the trim. Consult your Tyco Electronics' Account Manager or Application Engineer if the output voltage needs to be increased more than the above limitation.

The amount of power delivered by the module is defined as the voltage at the output terminals multiplied by the output current. When using remote sense and trim, the output voltage of the module can be increased, which at the same output current would increase the power output of the module. Care should be taken to ensure that the maximum output power of the module remains at or below the maximum rated power.

## Output Overvoltage Protection

The output overvoltage clamp consists of control circuitry, independent of the primary regulation loop, that monitors the voltage on the output terminals. This control loop has a higher voltage set point than the primary loop (see the Feature Specifications table). In a fault condition, the overvoltage clamp ensures that the output voltage does not exceed  $V_{O, \text{clamp, max}}$ . This provides a redundant voltage-control that reduces the risk of output overvoltage.

## Overtemperature Protection

These modules feature overtemperature protection to safeguard the modules against thermal damage.

When the temperature exceeds the overtemperature threshold given in the feature specifications table, the module will limit the available output current in order to help protect against thermal damage. The overcurrent inception point will gradually move back to its original level as the module is cooled below the overtemperature threshold.

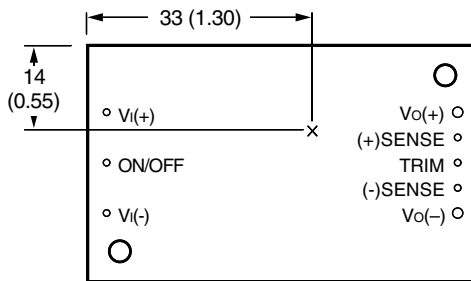
## Input Undervoltage Lockout

At input voltages below the input undervoltage lockout limit, the module operation is disabled. The module will begin to operate at an input voltage between the undervoltage lockout limit and the minimum operating input voltage.

## Thermal Considerations

### Introduction

The power modules operate in a variety of thermal environments; however, sufficient cooling should be provided to help ensure reliable operation of the unit. Heat-dissipating components inside the unit are thermally coupled to the case. Heat is removed by conduction, convection, and radiation to the surrounding environment. Proper cooling can be verified by measuring the case temperature. The case temperature should be measured at the position indicated in Figure 8.

The temperature at this location should not exceed 105 °C. The output power of the module should not exceed the rated power for the module as listed in the Ordering Information table.

Although the maximum case temperature of the power modules is 105 °C, you can limit this temperature to a lower value for extremely high reliability.

## Heat Transfer Without Heat Sinks

Increasing airflow over the module enhances the heat transfer via convection. Figures 9 and 10 show the maximum power that can be dissipated by the module without exceeding the maximum case temperature versus local ambient temperature ( $T_A$ ) for natural convection through 3 m/s (600 ft./min.).

Systems in which these power modules may be used typically generate natural convection airflow rates of 0.3  $\text{ms}^{-1}$  (60 ft./min.) due to other heat-dissipating components in the system. Therefore, the natural convection condition represents airflow rates of up to 0.3  $\text{ms}^{-1}$  (60 ft./min.). Use of Figure 9 is shown in the following example.

### Example

What is the minimum airflow necessary for a QW030A operating at  $V_I = 48$  V, an output current of 3.5 A, and a maximum ambient temperature of 89 °C?

### Solution

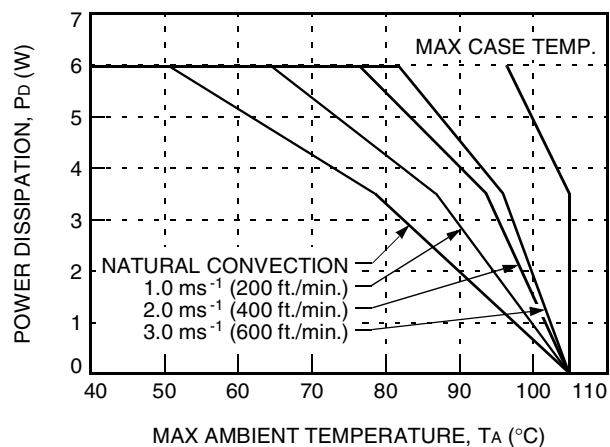
Given:  $V_I = 48$  V  
 $I_O = 3.5$  A  
 $T_A = 89$  °C

Determine  $P_D$  (Use Figure 12.):

$$P_D = 3 \text{ W}$$

Determine airflow ( $v$ ) (Use Figure 9.):

$$v = 1.0 \text{ m/s (200 ft./min.)}$$

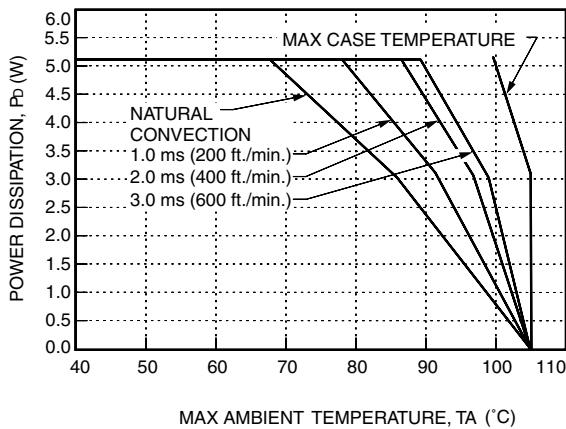

**Figure 9. QW030A, F Forced Convection Power Derating with No Heat Sink; Either Orientation**

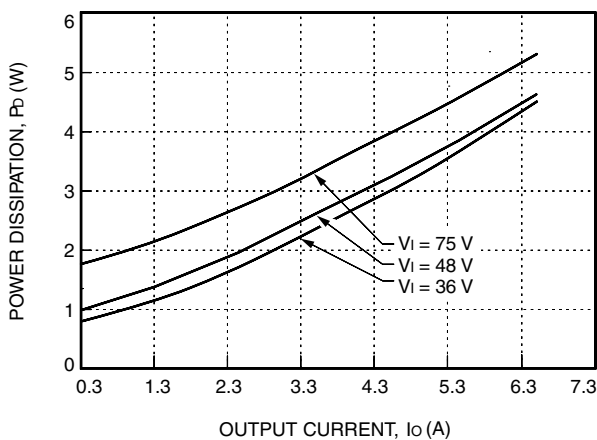

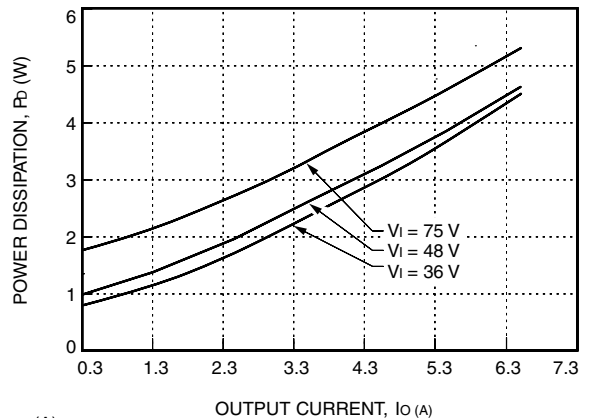

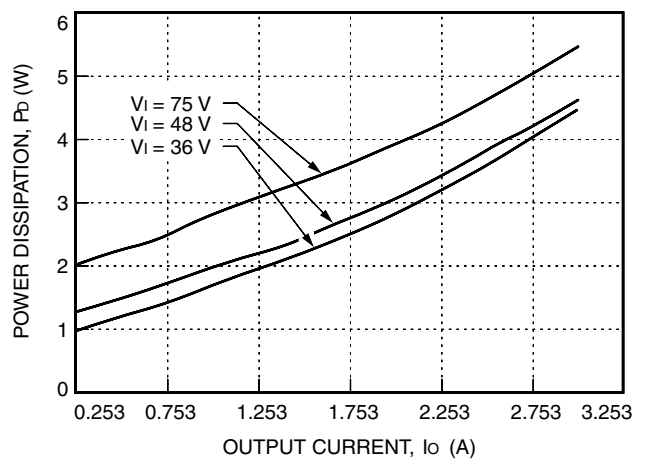
**Figure 11. QW030F Typical Power Dissipation vs. Output Current at TA = 25 °C**

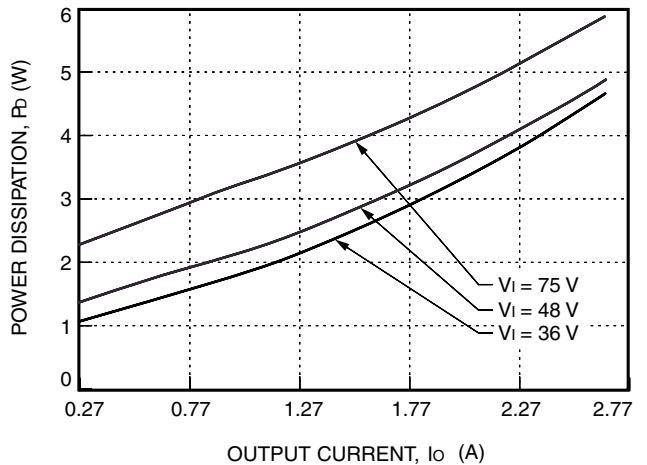


Figure 14. QW030C Typical Power Dissipation vs. Output Current at  $T_A = 25\text{ }^\circ\text{C}$

### Heat Transfer with Heat Sinks

The power modules have through-threaded, M3 x 0.5 mounting holes, which enable heat sinks or cold plates to attach to the module. The mounting torque must not exceed 0.56 N-m (5 in.-lb.). For a screw attachment from the pin side, the recommended hole size on the customer's PWB around the mounting holes is  $0.130 \pm 0.005$  inches. The mounting torque from the pin side must not exceed 0.25 N-m (2.2 in.-lbs.).

Thermal derating with heat sinks is expressed by using the overall thermal resistance of the module. Total module thermal resistance ( $\theta_{ca}$ ) is defined as the maximum case temperature rise ( $\Delta T_{C, \max}$ ) divided by the module power dissipation ( $P_D$ ):

$$\theta_{ca} = \left[ \frac{\Delta T_{C, \max}}{P_D} \right] = \left[ \frac{(T_C - T_A)}{P_D} \right]$$

The location to measure case temperature ( $T_C$ ) is shown in Figure 8. Consult your Tyco Electronics' Account Manager or Application Engineer for case-to-ambient thermal resistance vs. airflow for various heat sink configurations, heights, and orientations. Longitudinal orientation is defined as the long axis of the module that is parallel to the airflow direction, whereas in the transverse orientation, the long axis is perpendicular to the airflow. These curves are obtained by experimental testing of heat sinks, which are offered in the product catalog.

These measured resistances are from heat transfer from the sides and bottom of the module as well as the top side with the attached heat sink; therefore, the case-to-ambient thermal resistances shown are generally lower than the resistance of the heat sink by itself. The module used to collect the data in the case-to-ambient thermal resistance curves had a thermal-conductive dry pad between the case and the heat sink to minimize contact resistance.

### Custom Heat Sinks

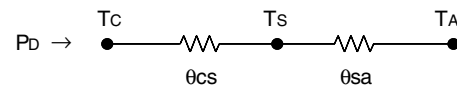


Figure 15. QC/QW030-Series Resistance from Case-to-Sink and Sink-to-Ambient

A more detailed model can be used to determine the required thermal resistance of a heat sink to provide necessary cooling. The total module resistance can be separated into a resistance from case-to-sink ( $\theta_{cs}$ ) and sink-to-ambient ( $\theta_{sa}$ ) as shown in Figure 15.

For a managed interface using thermal grease or foils, a value of  $\theta_{cs} = 0.1\text{ }^\circ\text{C/W}$  to  $0.3\text{ }^\circ\text{C/W}$  is typical. The solution for heat sink resistance is:

$$\theta_{sa} = \left[ \frac{(T_C - T_A)}{P_D} \right] - \theta_{cs}$$

This equation assumes that all dissipated power must be shed by the heat sink. Depending on the user-defined application environment, a more accurate model, including heat transfer from the sides and bottom of the module, can be used. This equation provides a conservative estimate for such instances.

### Layout Considerations

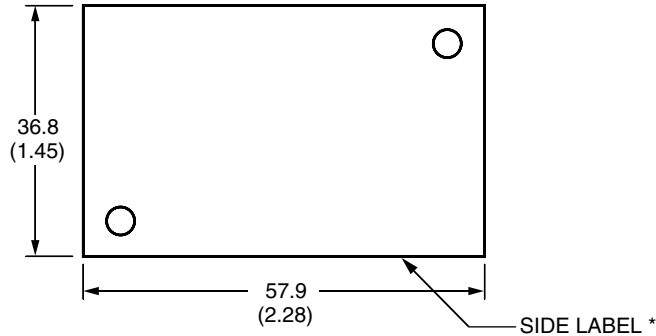
Copper paths must not be routed beneath the power module standoffs. For additional layout guidelines, refer to the FLTR100V10 or FLTR100V20 data sheet.

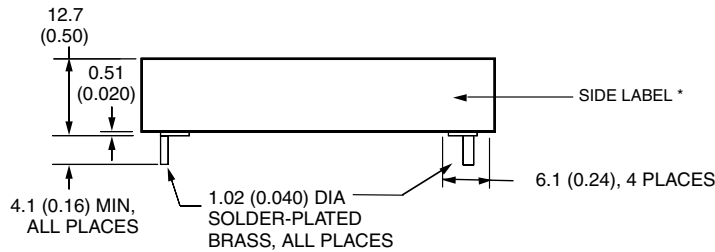

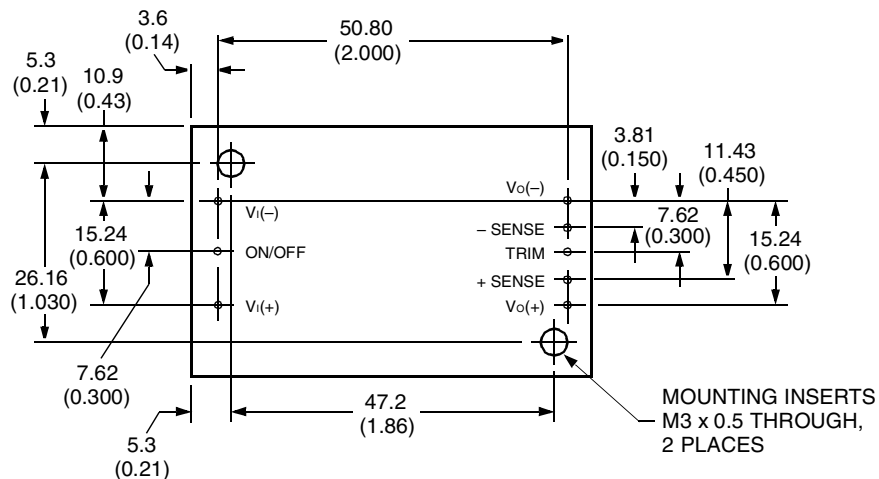

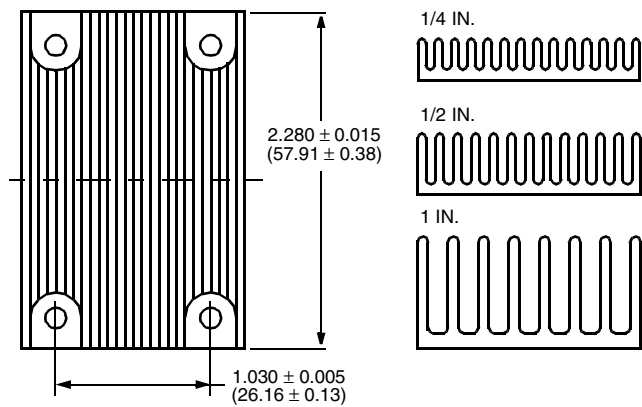

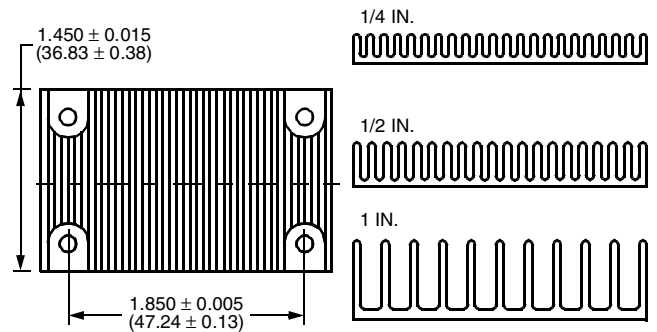
